Erasmus: Survey of the Attractiveness of Dublin as a destination for Study Visits













Introduction

Twenty-five years ago, the European Union took a bold step when they inaugurated the Erasmus Programme. Today, students from 33 European countries (EU 27 plus Croatia, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway, Switzerland, Turkey) can spend from three to twelve months on a study visit or placement in one of these countries. So far some 2.5m students have undertaken a period abroad including approximately 35,000 students from Irish Higher Education Institutions (HEIs).

In each participating country, a National Agency is appointed to manage the programme and since 1987 that task has been carried out by the Higher Education Authority – the statutory planning and development body for higher education and research in Ireland. A key function of the National Agency is to promote increased participation in the programme from among those HEIs eligible to take part. The Irish National Agency is also keenly interested in the experiences of students who come to this country. This interest is shared by the Office of International Relations and Research of Dublin City Council and in particular by the current Lord Mayor Andrew Montague (2011-12) who has been a strong advocate of the educational and personal benefits of spending a period abroad as a student. Among the innovations introduced by Lord Mayor Montague has been a prize for the International Student who best engages with Dublin City.

Arising from this shared interest, the Erasmus National Agency supported by Dublin City Council has conducted a survey of incoming Erasmus study visit students (2011-12) on the "Attractiveness of Dublin as a destination for Study Visits". Students attending the National University of Ireland, Maynooth (NUIM) were also included as many such students commute from Dublin City to NUIM. The purpose of the research is to identify areas where improvements might be made to better enhance the experience of Erasmus students who come to Dublin.

Since 2000, close to 40,000 students have come to Ireland as part of the initiative. Ireland is one of a small number of countries which takes in more students than it sends abroad. According to the most recent finalised set of statistics (2009-10), Ireland received 5,073 incoming students of which 3,958 (78%) were on study visits (attending an HEI in Ireland as part of their course) and 1,115 (22%) were on placements with Irish enterprises. The corresponding figure for outgoing students was 2,128 comprising 1,600 (75%) on study visits and 528 (25%) on placements.

Dublin received 1,711 incoming Erasmus Students on study visits or 43% of the total number who came to Ireland in 2010. The following tables capture the experiences of 315 respondents to the survey.

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ERASMUS STUDENT PROFILE

Based on the findings of this survey, a typical Erasmus Student visitor to Dublin is likely to be a female from France in the 20-25 age-bracket and attending Trinity College Dublin. The English language will have been the key attraction of Dublin as well as an established academic relationship between her home higher education institution (HEI) in France and a Dublin/Maynooth HEI and the reputation of the capital as a "friendly city".


WELCOME EXPERIENCE

Over 80% of students will have received a Welcome Social Event, Induction Session and/or Information Package on arrival from their host HEI. However only 43% will have enjoyed a Welcome Event at which Irish students from the host institution were present. Over a third will have been given some exposure to the Irish language with 28% getting the opportunity to sample gaelic games during their visit but 41% did not get the chance to interact with any aspect of Irish games, language, music, dance, theatre, drama or art.

STUDENT SUPPORT

Satisfaction with the level of student support offered by higher education institutions in the Dublin/Maynooth area is high with nearly 83% describing the assistance received from the International Office as "Good" or "Excellent". 79% of respondents said the support offered by Course Lecturers was "Good" or "Excellent" but 23% were dissatisfied with the level of support in the area of accommodation. The quality of facilities also compares favourably with the students' home institutions with 58% saying the Library was "Better" or "Much Better"; 51% indicating similar for computer facilities and 48% for sports facilities.

TRANSPORT

79% of respondents said they walked to college each day with 21% using Dublin Bus and some 19% cycled on occasions. The very low level of take-up of the Dublin Bikes facility reflects the lack of such stations on the campuses of HEIs and the general unavailability of the service outside the area bounded by the Grand and Royal Canals. Websites were the preferred information tool when it came to sourcing transport information — 84% — with only 10% using a Smart Phone app.

FRIENDSHIP

Half of the respondents found it "Easy" to make friends with only 4% finding it "Difficult". However, the friendship circle of most incoming Erasmus students tends to revolve around students from their own country or fellow Erasmus students. Nearly 64% said that Irish students counted for 50% or less of their friendship network. Nearly two-thirds of incoming students join a campus-based club or society but only 5% join clubs or societies which are external to the HEI.

INTERACTION WITH DUBLIN AND THE REST OF IRELAND

Erasmus Students are very active visitors to the major landmarks/tourist sites of Dublin.

Locations that have been visited by at least half of the incoming students include – Dublin

Castle, General Post Office, St Patrick's Cathedral, Christchurch Cathedral, National Gallery of

Ireland, Trinity College – Book of Kells, Guinness Storehouse, Phoenix Park, St Stephen's Green,

Temple Bar.

Two-thirds of respondents participated in the St Patrick's Festival, while attending football/hurling games at Croke Park, the Temple Bar TradFest, Rugby games at the AVIVA stadium and Culture Night were other popular social activities.

In terms of experiencing Dublin city and county, Erasmus students would appear to limit themselves to Dublin 1 – City Centre -36% and Dublin 2 – 36% with Grafton Street, St Stephen's Green and Merrion Square all popular attractions.

97% availed of the opportunity to visit another part of Ireland – County Galway was the most visited location with Connemara and the Aran Islands popular attractions. County Antrim is the second most visited county with Belfast and the Giant's Causeway particularly attractive destinations.

My Dublin Experience

The most positive aspect of the experience of Erasmus Students was the friends made and the friendliness of Irish people – 36%. Students also greatly welcomed the opportunity to improve their command of the English language and sharing a different cultural experience.

The negative aspects were the high cost of living in Dublin – 36% while the vagaries of the Irish weather failed to impress 18% of respondents.

91% agreed that there was always "something interesting" happening in Dublin and 61% of respondents like the visual appearance of the city.

There is a widespread perception of Dublin as a "safe" city both in terms of daytime and night-time activity. Over 90% rated the areas where they lived, studied and centre city as "safe" or "very safe" during the day.

88% said they did not encounter any form of religious, gender, racial, ethnic or other prejudice in Dublin. When the remaining 12% was examined it was impossible to draw any valid conclusions as the responses lacked clarity.

Students did find Dublin an "expensive" or "very expensive" city to live in – 90% – but there was satisfaction that clothing represented "good" or "excellent" value for money – 65%.

The most pleasing conclusion was that 91% "enjoyed" or "very much enjoyed" their Erasmus study visit to Dublin/Maynooth and nearly 96% would return for a holiday.
